Gators Ready to Raise Curtain on 2005 Campaign

Florida will begin its 91st season of baseball this weekend by welcoming Charleston Southern to McKethan Stadium for a three-game series. The Orange and Blue is coming off a tremendous 2004 season in which it finished 43-22 overall, tied for second in the SEC's Eastern Division, advanced to the semifinals of the SEC Tournament, captured the NCAA Oklahoma City Regional and reached NCAA Super Regionals for the first time.

List of Achievements by the University of Florida in '04

- Won 40 or more games for the 16th time in school history and for the sixth time in the last nine years.
- Won 43 or more games for the second time in head coach **Pat McMahon's** three seasons at the helm.
- The 43 victories were the second-highest figure for McMahon in his 12 years as a head coach, just behind the 46 wins he totaled during his debut season at UF in 2002.
- The Gator squad became only one of six in school history to win 37 of its first 50 games of the season.
- Advanced to NCAA Regionals for the 22nd time in school history and for the eighth time in nine years.
- Florida claimed the NCAA Oklahoma City Regional by defeating Central Connecticut (12-1) and UCLA (4-3, 11-0) to seize the championship. UF was one of six teams to win an NCAA Regional as the visiting team, joining Arizona, Long Beach State, Texas A&M, Tulane and Vanderbilt.
- The Regional crown earned Florida its first-ever NCAA Super Regional appearance, as the Gators were one of the final 16 teams playing in '04.
- Made its league-best 25th appearance at the SEC Tournament, where UF advanced to the semifinals and ousted regular-season champion Georgia.
- The Gators tied for second in the SEC's rugged Eastern Division and earned the sixth seed for the league's postseason tournament. In finishing 2-2 at the event held at the Hoover Metropolitan Stadium in Birmingham, Ala., UF picked up its 43rd win all-time in the tourney, the third-most of any school in the conference.
- The Gators went 27-9 (.750) in McKethan Stadium, winning 25 or more games at home for the sixth-straight season. The Gators turned in a 19-2 (.905) ledger on their own turf in non-league contests.
- Collected seven victories against teams that advanced to the 2004 College World Series.
- Boasted its first SEC Pitcher of the Year, junior righthander **Justin Hoyman**.
- Placed a league-high three individuals on the Academic All-District team and had 11 student-athletes make the SEC Academic Honor Roll.
- Had six players taken in the Major League Baseball Draft, giving Florida a total of 20 selections during McMahon's tenure.

Florida on Opening Day

UF sports a 51-38-1 (.572) record in its previous 90 opening day contests, including a 31-18-1 (.630) record at home. The Gators have claimed 18 of their last 22 lid-lifters and 12 of their last 13 season debuts in Gainesville. The squad's last defeat at McKethan Stadium in its opener was a 14-5 setback to Miami (Fla.) on Feb. 3, 2001. Florida has started the season on its own turf in seven of the past eight seasons, with the lone exception a 12-6 victory at Hawaii on Jan. 20, 2000.

Not Early Risers This Year

Feb. 11 marks the latest that the Gators have begun a campaign since 1983, when UF pinned a 3-1 defeat on Florida Tech at home on Feb. 12. The earliest opener in Gainesville occurred on Jan. 30, 1998, when the Orange and Blue embarked on its run to the College World Series with a 19-4 thrashing of Mercer. That season marked the squad's most recent trip to Omaha, Neb.

Positive Strides Out of the Gates

Pat McMahon is 9-3 (.750) all-time as a collegiate head coach on opening day, including a perfect 3-0 with the Gators. He was victorious in his coaching debut at Old Dominion in 1990, as the Monarchs nipped UNC Wilmington, 3-2. In season openers, McMahon was 4-1 at ODU between 1990-94 and an even 2-2 while guiding Mississippi State between 1998-2001.

High Rate of Production

In McMahon's 12 openers, his teams have outscored the opposition by a 158-41 margin for an average score of 13-3. His clubs have totaled 15 or more runs on five occasions and registered two shutouts, including a 14-0 whitewash of Gardner-Webb last February.

Another Notch on the Belt

The Gators' 15-5 season-opening triumph over Mercer on Feb. 7, 2003, was McMahon's 400th head coaching victory. The fourth-year UF skipper begins 2005 needing 21 wins to reach the 500-win plateau. McMahon has a 126-62-1 (.669) mark at Florida and was the quickest coach in school history to collect 100 wins.

What's Left in the Cupboard from 2004

Florida returns **18** lettermen, including **six** position starters, as well as **eight** pitchers. The Gators lost 13 lettermen, including the All-American trio of outfielder **Ben Harrison** (.353, 70 RBI, 17 HR), pitcher **Justin Hoyman** (11-2, 2.71 ERA, 89K in 139.2 IP) and first baseman **C.J. Smith** (.341, 64 RBI, 14 HR). UF welcomed 19 newcomers, 14 freshmen and five junior college transfers.

The Gator Connection

CSU first-year head coach **Jason Murray** served as a volunteer assistant at Florida in 2002, **Pat McMahon's** initial season at the helm. The squad went 46-19 overall and advanced to the NCAA Gainesville Regional final before succumbing to Miami (Fla.), 8-7.

Showing the Way

Charleston Southern boasts 13 seniors, as opposed to just four for the Gators (**Tommy Boss**, **Jeff Corsaletti**, **Connor Falkenbach**, **Mike Pete**).

Last Meeting Between UF & CSU

Florida will be hosting the Bucs for the first time since the 2003 campaign, when the home team notched a 10-9 triumph in 10 innings.

Charleston Southern overcame an 8-2 deficit with six runs in the seventh and the clubs traded runs to force extra innings. UF's **Matt Maley** drew a one-out walk in the 10th, stole second and came across when the relay throw wound up in center field.

Impact Player

In the clubs' last meeting, current Gator junior shortstop **Justin Tordi** belted his first career homer and ended 3-for-5 with three runs. The action was the third game of Tordi's collegiate career.

- Appeared in 17 games last season and made 14 starts.
- Started in all 10 SEC series in 2004 and was the Gators' starter during his final 12 appearances of the campaign.
- Turned in a 4-5 season ledger with just six walks in 76.1 innings pitched. Registered 34 strikeouts and fanned at least one batter in 11 of his 14 starts.
- Selected All-Tournament at the NCAA Oklahoma City Regional and was named Academic All-SEC for the second time.
- Over his last five starts, Boss was 2-3 but allowed just nine earned runs in 41.2 innings. The righty surrendered 38 hits, totaled 21 K and issued two walks on his way to a 1.94 ERA during that span.
- Totaled four or more innings in 11 of 14 starts and went 5.2 innings three times (March 28, April 9, May 14).

Second Trip to the Sunshine State This Season

The Buccaneers opened their season over Jan. 28-30 at Florida State, where they suffered a three-game sweep at the hands of the Seminoles by scores of 2-1, 9-2 and 11-4, respectively.

FSU limited its guests to a .128 (11-for-86) average and notched 24 strikeouts. For Charleston Southern, senior **Brad Woods** was 3-for-10 (.300) with a pair of stolen bases, while senior left-hander **Brad Bissell** limited the 'Noles to six hits and two runs in the season opener for both teams.

Breaking into the Win Column

CSU used a sacrifice fly from **Brad Woods** in the bottom of the ninth that scored classmate **Drew Grosse** with the decisive run as the Bucs nipped Claflin University, 2-1, on Feb. 4. The victory was the first of **Jason Murray's** head coaching career.

2004 Recap

The Bucs were 24-34 overall last year and placed sixth in the Big South Conference with an 11-13 record under the direction of **Gary Murphy**. The pitching staff registered an earned run average of 5.79 and was led by three-time all-conference pick **R.J. Swindle**, who established school marks in wins, strikeouts, games started and innings pitched. He is now in the organization of the 2004 World Series champion Boston Red Sox.

As a junior, **Brad Woods** led the Bucs in hitting with a .336 average, adding 10 homers and 36 RBI, while sharing time at catcher, second and third base. The Buccaneer outfield is boosted by the return of current seniors **Jordan Haar** and **Brian Sole**. Haar is school's career leader in home runs and set the single-season mark in '04 with 15 dingers. A threat on the basepaths, he swiped 24 bases in 25 attempts last season while earning all-conference honors. Sole batted .308 last year, with 45 RBI, 14 stolen bases and a dozen four-baggers.

Replacing the Ace

Right-hander **Justin Hoyman** became the first Gator hurler to collect the SEC's Pitcher of the Year Award in 2004. He started the season 10-0 and wound up earning first-team All-America honors from the ABCA, College Baseball Insider and Louisville Slugger. The junior was drafted in the second round of June's Major League Amateur Draft by the Cleveland Indians and signed a professional contract.

Ready for Some Home-Cooking?

Florida embarks on a school-record 21-game homestand beginning with Charleston Southern's visit and will not pack its bags until the start of SEC play between March 18-20 at Ole Miss. The Gators will play 38 of their 56 regular-season games within the friendly

confines of McKethan Stadium and will leave the Sunshine State for four other league series besides the trip to Oxford: Georgia (April 8-10), Auburn (April 22-24), Arkansas (May 6-8) and Vanderbilt (May 20-22).

Meyer to Make Debut at McKethan Stadium

Florida head football coach **Urban Meyer** will be throwing out the ceremonial first pitch prior to Friday night's season opener. The new Gator gridiron boss was a 13th-round selection in the 1982 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft as a shortstop. He spent two years in the Atlanta Braves' organization, playing in the summer of 1982 with Sarasota of the Rookie League and Pulasky (Va.), a Class A team in 1983.

Streaking Along

Sophomore right fielder **Brian Leclerc** enters the new season boasting a 10-game hitting streak that started on May 22 at Tennessee, when he cranked a two-run homer. During the skein, he is batting 15-for-35 (.429), a figure that raised his average from .283 to its finishing point of .312. As a rookie, the Clearwater, Fla., native ranked fourth on the Gators with 14 doubles and drove in 37 runs.

New Face in the Dugout

Tim Parenton will be donning the Orange and Blue for the first time this weekend as the newest member of **Pat McMahon's** coaching staff. Chosen as the 2004 Ohio Valley Conference Coach of the Year, he led Samford University to its first postseason appearance since 2002 and a third-place finish at the OVC Tournament. Parenton replaced **Tom Slater**, who took over the head coaching reins at Auburn.

Bracing for the Hot Corner

After sitting out last season while recovering from a life-threatening injury, **Brandon McArthur** is eager to begin his collegiate career. He is expected to start at third base for the Gators, a void created by the departure of standout **Jonathan Tucker**, who was selected by the Baltimore Orioles in June's Major League Draft.

Not Afraid of Flashing the Leather

UF's middle infield combination of second baseman **Adam Davis** and shortstop **Justin Tordi** was solid throughout the 2004 season. This was never more evident than the 21 games leading up to the NCAA Super Regional, as each player put together his career-best errorless streak. Before committing a miscue in the fifth inning of the first game at Miami (Fla.) on June 12, Davis had a stretch of 110 successful chances. Meanwhile, Tordi enters the 2005 campaign with a streak of 120 errorless chances. During that same time frame, the duo combined to turn 13 double plays, part of UF's school-record 75 double plays.

Staying in Control

Florida's pitching staff consistently found the strike zone last season, as indicated by its SEC-low 23 wild pitches. Much of this success can also be attributed to the Gators' catching corps, which was stellar in controlling balls in the dirt. While UF uncorked a wild pitch in just 17 of 65 outings, its opponents were charged with 77 wild pitches.

Power Surge

Matt LaPorta enjoyed a tremendous rookie season in which he tied for second on the squad with 14 homers despite only 130 at bats. This statistic is even more remarkable considering he did not belt a four-bagger until his 11th career at bat. LaPorta averaged a long ball once every 9.3 at bats, while **Ben Harrison** knocked a ball out of the yard every 14 at bats on his way to a team-high 17 HR. LaPorta slugged a pair of homers during the second game of the Tennessee series on May 22.

Home Sweet Home

Florida went 27-9 (.750) at Alfred A. McKethan Stadium at Perry Field last year to exceed the 25-win mark at home for the sixth year in succession and the 20th time in the program's history. Since **Pat McMahon** took over the Gators prior to the

2002 season, Florida is 90-24 (.789) in its own domain.

Light up the Board

The big inning was crucial in Florida's offense averaging 7.2 runs per game in 2004. UF totaled 114 innings in which it plated two or more runs and 26 innings with five or more runs. In fact, the Gators had nearly as many as five runs or more innings (26) as they had three and four-run innings (35).

Don't Expect Handouts

Last season, the Florida pitching staff led the SEC in fewest walks and bested the school-record mark of 2.34 walks per game that was set in 2003. Gator pitchers issued 141 base on balls in '04 (2.17 per game) and only permitted 42 walks in the last 25 games. UF's staff yielded 60 walks in 30 SEC games.

Starting Pitchers Love the Support

The Gators often used a quick-strike offense to seize the advantage early in games, amassing a 175-100 edge during the first three innings. During the rest of the game, between the fourth and ninth frames, Florida held a 284-230 advantage over its opponents.

UF played nine extra-inning affairs and out-scored foes by a slim 10-9 margin. On the season, McMahon's team wound up with an overall edge of 469-339 (+130) cushion on the scoreboard.

Keep an Eye on Number Seven

Senior outfielder **Jeff Corsaletti** was one of 58 student-athletes named to the 2005 Wallace Watch List released in late November by the College Baseball Foundation in Lubbock, Texas. The Brooks Wallace Award is presented annually to the National College Baseball Player of the Year. **Kurt Suzuki** of Cal State Fullerton was the 2004 recipient.

As a junior, Corsaletti started 63 of Florida's 65 games and ranked third on the squad in batting average (.323), hits (81), runs batted in (43) and triples (two). He scored 47 runs, poked 12 doubles and swiped a career-high 11 bases in 18 opportunities. He was selected to the NCAA Oklahoma City Regional All-Tourney team following a .385 (5-for-13) showing in UF's three-game sweep of the event that clinched the school's first NCAA Super Regional appearance.

Corsaletti started all 30 SEC games and hit .310 in a team-high 129 at bats. In league play, he rated third on the Orange and Blue in hits (40) and walks (11) and was fourth in runs (22) and RBI (19). He was tabbed as the SEC Player of the Week for the first time in his career on May 3 after a sizzling .615 (8-for-13) performance against Auburn. During the three-game sweep of the Tigers, Corsaletti

scored seven runs and totaled seven RBI. In the series finale, he went 4-for-5 with a pair of doubles and a homer for a season-high nine total bases.

The center fielder also enjoyed a career-high 14-game hitting streak between March 12-April 4, a stretch in which he batted .333 (20-for-60). Patrolling the outfield, with 55 starts in center and eight in left, he committed just two errors in 149 chances for a .987 fielding percentage. The Wallace Watch will be trimmed to 12 semifinalists by Tuesday, May 24, 2005.

Peering into the Crystal Ball

LSU was the favorite in the league's 14th annual preseason poll to win the SEC Baseball Championship. The Tigers seek to capture their 14th SEC Championship, having won or shared the title three times in the past nine seasons (1996, 1997 & 2003) and seven times since 1990. LSU returns six starters and all but one pitcher from its 2004 squad that advanced to the College World Series.

Since 1996, the SEC has named a regular-season champion as well as a tournament champion. Prior to '96, the tournament champion was considered the SEC Champion. In the voting for the overall SEC Champion, LSU was listed on nine of the 12 ballots. South Carolina received two votes, while Florida received one. UF's last SEC crown occurred in 1998 and its most recent SEC Tournament hardware was earned in 1991.

In addition to picking a preseason champion, the league's head coaches voted a predicted order of finish in the SEC's Eastern and

LSU was the predicted winner of the West with a total of 66 points, collecting the maximum possible figure for a single team. Ole Miss placed second with 51 points and picked up the other first-place vote, followed by Arkansas in third with 46 points. The trio of Mississippi State (30), Alabama (29) and Auburn (23) occupied the next three positions.

Points were compiled on a 6-5-4-3-2-1 basis for each division and coaches were not allowed to vote for their own team. Each coach also voted for one team as an overall conference champion.

Great Expectations

Junior right-hander **Alan Horne** was picked as the SEC's Newcomer of the Year by SEBaseball.com. A 2001 first-round draft pick of the Cleveland Indians out of Marianna High School, Horne began his collegiate career at the Ole Miss and was a honorable mention Freshman All-American before suffering a season-ending arm injury during his sophomore campaign.

He attended Chipola Junior College in Marianna, Fla., last spring and was drafted in the 30th round of the Major League Baseball Draft by the Anaheim Angels. Horne competed for the Wareham Gatemen of the prestigious Cape Cod League during the summer of 2004 and struck out 45 batters in 34 innings.

Schedule Overview

The Gators' 56-game regular-season slate features 38 games in their domain of McKethan Stadium at Perry Field and 29 games versus opponents who advanced to NCAA play last season. In addition, UF has a dozen contests on tap against a quartet of 2004 College World Series participants in Arkansas, Georgia, Miami (Fla.) and South Carolina.

Pat McMahon's club plays one of the toughest schedules in college baseball each season, and last year's version was rated as the sixth-most difficult in Division I. The Gators' 2005 docket boasts 21 games against squads that finished among the top 20 in the final version of the 2004 Ratings Percentage Index. An assortment of national foes will visit Gainesville, including NCAA participants Army and UCF, as well as Florida A&M, Mercer, Michigan State, Rhode Island, UNC Asheville and Villanova.

Florida will also be challenged by the rugged 30-game SEC schedule, not to mention three meetings apiece versus traditional in-state rivals Miami and Florida State. The five SEC home three-game series pit the Gators against South Carolina (March 25-27), Kentucky (April 1-3), Alabama (April 15-17), Tennessee (April 29-May 1) and Mississippi State (May 13-15). Florida will open the SEC schedule in Oxford on March 18 against Ole Miss and is not slated to face Western Division rival and recent CWS participant LSU during the regular season.

In addition to the series with the Rebels in the Magnolia State, other SEC stops on the Gators' itinerary include trips to Georgia (April 8-10), Auburn (April 22-24), Arkansas (May 6-8) and Vanderbilt (May 20-22). The visit to the Plains will feature a reunion of sorts, as former Gator assistant coach **Tom Slater** is in his debut season leading the Tigers.

In the East, South Carolina was the favorite with 63 points and nine first-place votes, Georgia tallied one first-place vote and was the runner-up with 50 points, while the Gators occupied third with 48 points and snagged two votes to take the division. Highlighting the list of alumni was legendary Florida baseball coach **Dave Fuller**, who collected a school-record 557 victories between 1948-75, and shortstop **David Eckstein** (1994-97) of the St. Louis Cardinals. Several other active professional players also played in the game and attended the weekend events.

Fourth Annual Home Run Derby a Success

Before several hundred spectators on a sun-splashed Saturday afternoon on Feb. 5, the University of Florida baseball team and the Gator Dugout Club hosted the Fourth Annual Children's Miracle Network Home Run Derby and "Meet the Players" autograph session at McKethan Stadium. All of the money raised from the event will be donated to the Children's Miracle Network at Shands Children Hospital.

The 40 members of the 2005 UF squad were divided into 10 different groups containing four players. Junior **Daniel Brooks** rocketed to the lead by spraying 10 balls out of McKethan Stadium, including several deep over the left field fence into the bleachers, before senior **Jeff Corsaletti** answered with nine jacks of his own.

Led by two shots from sophomore **Brian Leclerc**, the final group's total of three homers enabled the Gators to finish with 63 round-trippers, the exact same figure as last year. Money pledged by various individuals and groups will now be collected and the Children's Miracle Network will be presented with a check prior to one of the UF games at McKethan Stadium this spring.

Calvin Lee, a 12-year-old who received a kidney transplant in November 2003, and 15-year-old **Anthony Tornese**, a bone marrow transplant recipient, threw out a ceremonial first pitches and helped shag balls with the Orange and Blue throughout the afternoon.

Alumni Weekend

More than 70 University of Florida baseball alumni returned to campus on Nov. 12-13, 2004 for the annual Gator Baseball Alumni Weekend. A Home Run Derby and Gator Legends and Gator Greats Baseball Games featuring alumni versus alumni competition highlighted the activities at McKethan Stadium.

The weekend kicked off on Friday with a golf scramble at the Ironwood Golf Course. Prizes were awarded Saturday to several winners, including closest to the pin (**Jim Britton**) and longest drive (**Rick Britton**). There was a three-way tie for the tournament championship among the foursomes of current UF trainer **John Barrett**, **Jeff Cordozo** (1998-2000), **Brian Fleetwood** (current assistant coach) and **C.J. Smith** (2002-04); **Jason Beard** (1990-91), **Jim Britton**, **Rick Britton** (1990-93) and **Todd McCray** (1989-90); **Alan Chatman** (1980-81), **Mike Moberg** (1986-90), **Rick Scarborough** (1969-72) and **Johnny Wiggs** (1988-89).

Following an early morning brunch overlooking right field provided by the Gator Dugout Club, the coaching staff hosted a Hitters' Challenge Home Run Derby to kick off Saturday's festivities. After two practice cuts, each batter had six swings to amass a point total. The system was based on the following: six points for a home run, three points for a shot hitting the wall, two points for a hit to the warning track or off the pitcher's screen and one point for a ball hit out of the infield. Each decade had its own champion: **Don McCreary** (eight points - 1950s), **Rick Scarborough** (10 points - 1960s), **Marc Sullivan** (eight points - 1970s), **Mike Moberg** (10 points - 1980s), **Shane Spears** (14 points -

Head Coach Pat McMahon - Fourth Season at Florida

From the moment he was handed the reins of the University of Florida baseball program on June 13, 2001, Pat McMahon has worked diligently to continue the Gators' winning tradition on the diamond. Having fashioned a squad emphasizing traits of hard work, loyalty, enthusiasm, dedication to academics and a commitment to excellence, McMahon is beginning to reap the fruits of his labor. He reached a personal milestone with the 450th win of his Division I career against Purdue on March 6, 2004, and became the fastest coach to reach the 100-victory plateau in the sport's 90-year history at UF following a 6-5 triumph over Brown a week later in Gainesville.

Heading into the 2005 campaign, McMahon has his sights set upon guiding the Gators to their school-record sixth consecutive NCAA Regional appearance and another stellar performance in the nation's premier league: the Southeastern Conference. After directing the Orange and Blue to the NCAA Super Regional for the initial time last June, he is hopeful that an underclassmen-laden squad can navigate its way one step further to the

College World Series in Omaha, Neb.

Returning six position starters from a '03 club that was stopped in the Regional final for the second year in a row, McMahon blended several talented newcomers with a core of veterans to help Florida reach uncharted territory in 2004. Following a regular season in which they finished second in the SEC's Eastern Division with a 17-13 mark, their second-highest league win total in five years, the sixth-seeded Gators had a tremendous showing at the SEC Tournament. UF surprised third-seeded LSU in the opening round, 5-4 in 10 innings, and later eliminated second-seeded Georgia, 7-0, before succumbing to eventual runner-up Vanderbilt in a classic 12-inning semifinal encounter.

Rewarded with the top seed at the Oklahoma City Regional, McMahon's charges notched victories over Central Connecticut State (12-1) and UCLA (4-3) before routing the Bruins in the rematch, 11-0, to punch their ticket for Coral Gables, Fla. Although UF ultimately came up short against Miami during its inaugural appearance at the Super Regional, there were plenty of highlights that should serve as added motivation for this season.

Florida finished the '04 campaign 43-22 overall, winning 40 or more games for the second time in McMahon's three years at the helm, and has registered at least 30 triumphs for 14 straight seasons. Becoming the sixth Gator club to take 37 of its first 50 outings, the never-say-die attitude instilled by the coaching staff paid off for the team with an amazing 16 wins in its final at bat.

Once again, the awards and recognition continued to pour in for McMahon's players, both on the field and in the classroom. Right-hander Justin Hoyman etched his name into the record book as the first player from Florida to be honored as the SEC Pitcher of the Year and was later one of five semifinalists for the Roger Clemens Award, presented annually to the nation's top pitcher. Hoyman was accorded All-America status by seven different publications, while righty Connor Falkenbach, outfielder Ben Harrison and first baseman C.J. Smith also appeared on various All-America lists. Adam Davis and Matt LaPorta were first-team Freshman All-America selections by Louisville Slugger and *Baseball America*, respectively, with rookies Brian Jeroloman and Brian Leclerc securing second-team honors from both organizations.

Eleven players achieved SEC Academic Honor Roll acclaim, with the trio of Harrison, Darren O'Day and Smith picking up second-team All-District III recognition. McMahon has stressed academic excellence during his coaching career, evidenced by his 37 Academic All-SEC selections at Florida over his first three seasons. He has mentored 72 SEC Honor Roll choices since 1998 and last season UF was the lone school in the conference boasting three Academic All-District selections.

His 2003 squad, sporting seven fresh faces in the starting lineup, wound up just a few runs shy of a NCAA Super Regional despite posting 37 wins and finishing 31-6 in McKethan Stadium. The Gators appeared at NCAA Regionals for the seventh time in eight years and emerged victorious in five different SEC series, including a sweep of Tennessee. In addition, McMahon oversaw a perfect 12-0 mark in mid-week games, a feat that had never been accomplished in school history, and picked up his 400th collegiate head coaching victory in the season-opening romp over Mercer, 15-5.

Success has followed McMahon at every destination. In his first year at Florida, he led the Gators to a 46-19 record and second-place SEC finish at 20-10. This was an 11-victory improvement from a 35-27, seventh-place SEC finish the previous year. Furthermore, McMahon's 2002 squad hosted its first NCAA Regional since 1998, set 45 team and individual school records and led the conference in 13 team and individual statistical categories. In addition, a school-record eight Gators were selected in the Major League Baseball Draft held in June 2002.

He arrived at Florida after serving for four years as the head coach at SEC Western Division rival Mississippi State. While manning the bench in Starkville, he directed the Bulldogs to a College World Series appearance in 1998, consecutive NCAA Super Regional berths (2000 and 2001) and four straight NCAA Regional berths. In 2001, the Maroon and White claimed its first SEC Tournament title since 1990 and reached NCAA Super Regional play for the second straight season en route to a 39-24 mark.

McMahon took over the Mississippi State baseball program in 1998 following three seasons as Associate Head Coach under Ron Polk, signaling the start of four successful years McMahon would spend leading the 'Dogs. In his season debut, McMahon was tabbed as the American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA) South Region Coach of the Year after taking Mississippi State to the College World Series. Remarkably, he became just the second coach in SEC history to lead a school to the CWS during his first season in the league.

From 1983-89, he served as an assistant for Polk, helping the Bulldogs scale new heights on the diamond. During that seven-year stretch, Mississippi State enjoyed some of its more memorable moments, claiming six NCAA Regional berths and securing three College World Series appearances while hosting five Regionals at Dudy Noble Field. MSU's powerful 1985 squad, featuring eventual major league standouts Jeff Brantley, Will Clark, Rafael Palmeiro and Bobby Thigpen, proved to be one of the most accomplished teams in college baseball history. The 'Dogs posted first-ever 50-plus win season (50-15) en route to a tie for third place at the College World Series. The 1989 team bettered that mark with a 54-14 finish, the school's 10th SEC baseball crown and a runner-up performance in the NCAA South Regional.

McMahon journeyed back to Norfolk and guided Old Dominion to newfound prominence and levels of success between 1990-94, including two NCAA Regional appearances, a pair of school-record 40-plus win seasons and an outstanding 189-86 (.687) record. His 1994 edition sported a 40-14 overall mark, seized the Colonial Athletic Association regular-season title and advanced to the NCAAs. For his efforts, he was honored as the Coach of the Year by both the CAA and the state of Virginia.

McMahon and his wife, the former Cheri Wells of Jacksonville, Fla., are the parents of a 15-year-old daughter Logan, and an 11-year-old son, J. Wells. McMahon is the oldest of Jack and Pat McMahon's eight children.
