Coaching Accomplishments

▣ Possesses 21 years of coaching experience, has been part of six bowl games and a member of three coaching staffs that have won conference championships.

▣ Instructs the Florida tight ends as well as offensive tackles and assists with special team efforts.

▣ Addazio went to Indiana after spending the previous three seasons at the University of Notre Dame, where he served as the offensive line, tight ends and special teams coach between 1999-2001.

▣ Prior to his tenure at Notre Dame, Addazio served on the staff at Syracuse University for four seasons (1995-98). The Orange won three-straight Big East crowns during Addazio's four seasons and appeared in four bowl games.

▣ Prior to Addazio's Division I collegiate coaching career, he served as one of the nation's top high school coaches at Cheshire High School in Cheshire, Conn. He placed over 20 student-athletes in Division I-A, I-AA, II, and III programs in his seven years. His teams were nationally ranked in both 1992 and 1994. During one stretch, his club won 34 consecutive games, the second-longest string in the nation. His teams also won three state titles in a row.

▣ Addazio began his coaching career at Western Connecticut State University, where he served as an assistant coach under Paul Pasqualoni from 1984-87. The Colonials claimed the New England Football Conference title in 1985 and advanced to the NCAA Division III playoffs for the first time in school history.

OT RANDY HAND – Named to the 2005 AP and Coaches' Second Team All-SEC team. Played in 47 games with 41 starts including the last 34 games of his college career.

INDIANA:

LT ENOCH DeMAR – Three-time All-Big Ten selection who started in the 2002 Hula Bowl. Also served as co-captain for the Hoosiers and earned Academic All-Big Ten four times.

WR COURTNEY ROBY – Indiana's all-time career leader in receptions (170) and receiving yards (2,524).

Was an All-Big Ten second team choice in 2004. Led the Hoosiers in receiving three straight seasons. Selected in the third round of the 2005 NFL Draft by the Tennessee Titans.

NOTRE DAME:

TE JABARI HOLLOWAY – Rated third nationally among tight ends in 2000 preseason rankings by both *The Sporting News* and *Lindy's*. Named to 2000 preseason All-Independent teams by *The Sporting News* and *Football News*. Combined with Dan O'Leary to provide Notre Dame with solid pairing at the tight end position. Listed as first-team preseason All-America tight end for '99 by *Lindy's* – and was rated seventh nationally among tight ends in '99 preseason position evaluations by *The Sporting News*. Selected to play in the 2001 Delchamps Senior Bowl All-Star Game.

TE DAN O'LEARY – Led all 2000 Notre Dame receivers in playing time and caught 10 passes for 87 yards and one touchdown. Developed into a consistently solid blocker to go along with his impressive receiving skills.

OG SCOTT KIERNAN – First-team All-Big East offensive guard.

▣ Has spent 10 years coaching running backs on the collegiate level in addition to three seasons in the NFL.

▣ Guided the UF running backs to out-rush 10 of 12 opponents in his first season on the

Gator coaching staff. The group averaged 4.9 yards per carry and lost only one fumble in 279 carries in 2005.

▣ Tutored DeShawn Wynn, who became the first Gator to score four touchdowns in a game twice in his career (vs. Florida A&M, 2003 and at Kentucky, 2005).

▣ Helped Green Bay to three-straight National Football Conference Divisional Playoff appearances.

▣ Helped Villanova reach the 1996 and '97 NCAA Division I-AA playoffs as the Wildcats advanced through the playoff system.

▣ 1997 Villanova team reached No. 1 ranking during the regular season.

▣ Inducted into the Allegheny College Athletic Hall of Fame on June 5, 2005, for accomplishments in football and track career.

▣ Worked in May of 2002 as an instructor at Marco Rivera's youth football camp in Puerto Rico.

Prominent Players Coached

VILLANOVA:

RB CURTIS SIFFORD – The first running back in Villanova history to rush for more than 1,000 yards.

RB BRIAN WESTBROOK – A two-time All-American who in 1998 became the first player on any collegiate level to record more than 1,000 yards rushing and 1,000 yards receiving in the same season. Holds the NCAA Division I-AA record for career all-purpose yards with 9,512. Winner of the 2001 Walter Payton Award, given annually to the Offensive Player of the Year in NCAA Division I-AA. Was a third-round selection by the Philadelphia Eagles in the 2002 NFL Draft.

MISSISSIPPI STATE:

RB JERIOUS NORWOOD – The SEC's third-leading rusher in 2004, Norwood gained 1,050 yards on 195 carries (5.4 yards per carry). He finished fourth among SEC players in 2004 in all-purpose yards by averaging 98.8 yards per game. Ranked fifth all-time on MSU's single-season list with 1,050 rushing yards. He became the sixth MSU player ever (seventh occurrence) to rush for 1,000 yards in a single year.

▣ A three-year starter as running back at Allegheny (Pa.) College, he was a three-time, first-team All-America selection and an Associated Press Little America first-team member. Drayton is Allegheny's all-time leading rusher and scorer and was a member of the 1990 Division III national championship team. He holds the Division III single-season record for touchdowns scored per game (3.2). Drayton was a two-time All-America in track and field as well, competing in the 100- and 200m dashes.

Coaching Accomplishments

- ▣ 12 seasons of coaching experience.
- ▣ For five-straight seasons, a wide receiver has ranked among the top-20 nationally in catches per game. Under his guidance, the leading receiver on the squads have averaged to haul in nearly 80 passes a season (79.8).
- ▣ In 2005, helped junior Chad Jackson match the UF single-season reception record held by Carlos Alvarez (88 receptions). The total ranked sixth nationally, first in the SEC for the season and fourth all-time.
- ▣ Jackson and Dallas Baker finished first and seventh in the SEC in 2005 in receptions per game with 7.3 and 4.3, respectively, and third and eighth in the conference in receiving yards per game with 75.0 and 58.1. UF was one of only two schools to have two players finish in the top 10 in receptions per game and one of three to have two do so in receiving yards per game.
- ▣ For two-straight seasons his position produced the bowl game MVP with Paris Warren (Utah, Fiesta Bowl, 2005) and Baker (Florida, Outback Bowl, 2006).
- ▣ Receivers became a part of the running aspect of the Florida offense in 2005 as the group carried the ball 26 times for 162 yards and three touchdowns. The Gator offense averaged 6.2 yards per play when a member of the unit was carrying the ball.
- ▣ Worked with an explosive Utah offense in 2004 that recorded 499.8 yards per game (No. 3 nationally), including 263.7 yards



receiving (19th nationally) and an average of 14 yards per catch.

▣ Under his guidance, sophomore Steve Savoy and senior Paris Warren each earned All-Mountain West Conference recognition at wide receiver in 2004. Savoy (67 catches, 961 yards) had 11 touchdown receptions and averaged 80.1 yards per game and 14.3 per catch. Warren (80 catches, 1,076 yards) caught 12 touchdowns and averaged 13.4 yards per reception.

▣ Four different Utes totaled over 350 yards receiving during the squad's perfect 12-0 season: Paris Warren (1,076), Steve Savoy (961), Travis LaTendresse (411) and John Madsen (377). Overall, Utah wide receivers scored 39 touchdowns in 2004.

▣ Worked with Paris Warren, who set a Fiesta Bowl receptions record with 15 for 198 yards and two touchdowns against Pittsburgh in January of 2005.

▣ Warren set a Ute single-season reception record with 80 catches in 2004 and also led the league in receptions per game (6.67), a total that ranked 17th in the nation.

▣ The Ute kickers were a perfect 7-for-7 in field goal attempts in 2004 and senior punter Matt Kovacevich was an honorable mention All-MWC pick after averaging 41.7 yards per

kick. In 2004, the Utes led the league and ranked third nationally in net punting (40.8) and were tops among the MWC and fifth nationally in kick returns (26.2) after leading the country in the department in 2003 (28.2).

▣ During his first season as Utah's receivers coach in 2003, he inherited a receiving corps that had graduated its top three players from the previous campaign. Helped develop Paris Warren, playing for the first time in two years after transferring from Oregon, into a first-team All-Mountain West Conference receiver.

▣ Also coached Ben Moa, a first-team All-MWC tight end who trained with the receivers. In addition, freshman Steve Savoy was named an honorable mention Freshman All-American by *College Football News*.

▣ Coached the receivers and served as co-recruiting coordinator at Bowling Green during the 2002 season. In two years with the Falcons, Gonzales assisted with one of the most explosive offenses in the nation. Bowling Green ranked third nationally in scoring offense (40.8 points per game) and was ninth in total offense (448.92 yards per game).

▣ Receiver Robert Redd was a two-time first-team All-Mid-American Conference selection who ranked 10th in the nation in receptions per game in 2002.

▣ Spent the 1995-2000 seasons at Kent State, including the last four years in a full-time role. Coached the wide receivers between 1998-2000. Was an offensive graduate assistant for the Golden Flashes from 1995-96 before becoming the running backs coach in 1997.

▣ Began his coaching career in 1994 at MacMurray College (Ill.), a Division III program. He was hired by Midwestern (Texas) State, an NCAA Division II school, after the 1994 season but stayed only through the spring before taking a graduate assistantship at Kent State.

Playing Career

▣ Lettered for Colorado State from 1989-93 and started two seasons at wide receiver. His position coach from 1990-93 was Urban Meyer.

▣ Gonzales also returned kickoffs and punts and is one of only two players in CSU history to lead the team in punt returns three consecutive seasons (1989-91). His punt return averages in those seasons were 11.0, 11.5 and 8.2, respectively. Gonzales was a return specialist for the 1990 Ram Freedom Bowl team that beat Oregon 32-31.

WR CHAD JACKSON – 2005 Biletnikoff Award Semifinalist who was also a first-team All-SEC selection by the AP and a second-team choice by the league's coaches. His 88 receptions in 2005 matched Carlos Alvarez's single-season school record and ranked sixth nationally. Drafted in the second round by the New England Patriots with the 36th overall pick in 2006.

TE BEN MOA – First-team All-MWC tight end in 2003, also played U back.

WR STEVE SAVOY – First-team All-MWC choice in 2004 who was a 2003 honorable mention Freshman All-American by *College Football News*.

WR PARIS WARREN – First-team All-MWC wide receiver in 2003 and second-team all-league selection in 2004. Set single-season reception record in 2004 and was named the 2005 Fiesta Bowl MVP. Selected in the seventh round of the 2005 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

WR ROBERT REDD – Two-time All-MAC wide receiver (2001-02) who became Bowling Green's all-time leader in receptions.

30 years of coaching experience, including stints at Colorado, Northern Arizona, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Toledo, Utah, Washington and Wisconsin.

Has been associated with six National Coaches of the Year in his playing and coaching career (Barry Alvarez, Earle Bruce, Lou Holtz, Urban Meyer, Bill McCartney and Bo Schembechler).

Has mentored 20 NFL draft selections and 23 NFL players as well as numerous all-conference picks, including Jim Thorpe Award winner Chris Hudson (Colorado).

Has coached in 19 bowl games, including six on New Year's Day.

Tutored the 2005 cornerbacks at Florida that were part of a secondary that allowed just 52.3 percent of passes to be completed – the 16th-best percentage nationally. A member of the UF secondary had a sack in five of the 12 games on the year.

The Florida secondary also picked off 16 passes in 2006 – tied for best in the SEC.

Recruiting coordinator for the 2006 Florida class that ranked among the top two nationally, including number one by several services.

Coached All-SEC performer Dee Webb in 2005 (First Team by AP and Second Team by coaches), who led the SEC in pass deflections and team MVP Vernell Brown, who ranked second in the SEC in interceptions.

Working alongside Florida head coach Urban Meyer at the fourth different Division I program. In 1986, Heater coached the secondary at Ohio State when Meyer was a graduate assistant. They coached together again at Colorado State from 1991-92: Heater as the defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach and Meyer as the receivers coach. Heater was also a member of the Utah coaching staff in 2004.

Served as the cornerbacks coach and recruiting coordinator during the 2004 campaign at Utah, as the Utes completed a perfect 12-0 season.

Spent five years at Washington as either the cornerbacks or running backs coach between 1999-2003 and also served as the Huskies' recruiting coordinator.

Was credited with helping the school sign three recruiting classes rated in the top 15. Three of his recruiting classes produced a Freshman All-American.

In 2002, he switched from the corners to the running backs. He also oversaw the Huskies' punt and kick return teams.

Spent six years as an assistant coach at Colorado (1993-98), originally joining the CU staff as the director of football operations and recruiting coordinator. He returned to on-field coaching in 1994 when he took over as the defensive backs coach. He coached the tight ends during his last four seasons in Boulder.

During his first season at Notre Dame, he was a member of the coaching staff that led the Irish to a 12-0 record and the 1988 national championship.

Was the secondary coach at Notre Dame (1988-90), Ohio State (1985-87) and Wisconsin (1982-84).

Coached the running backs from 1977-78 and the secondary at Toledo from 1979-81.

Began his collegiate coaching career in 1976 at Northern Arizona coaching the Lumberjacks' running backs.

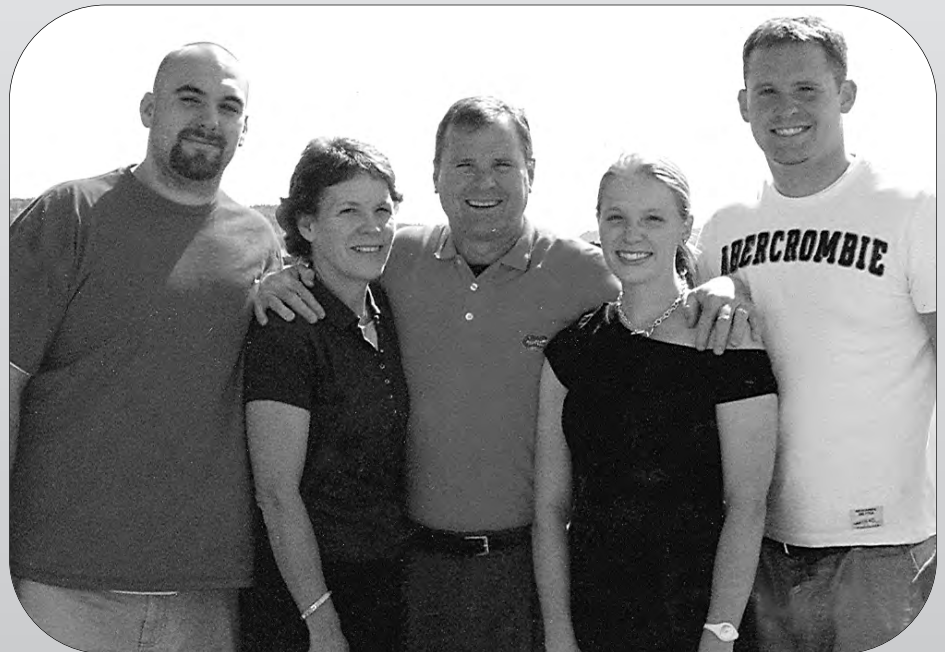

The Fighting Irish defense permitted 94.4 yards per game to rank ninth in the NCAA regular-season statistics.

The 2003 Irish defensive line produced 24 of the Irish's single season-record 39 quarterback sacks, including a school-record 13.5 sacks by defensive end Justin Tuck. In 2002, the Irish line recorded 37 sacks for a total of 241 yards, a drastic improvement from 2001 totals.

As defensive coordinator at Notre Dame in 2001, his unit ranked 14th in the nation in total defense including 10th in the country in pass defense and 22nd in scoring defense.

In 2000, the Irish defense recorded 33 sacks.

The 1998 Notre Dame defense gave up only 16.4 points per game over its last nine regular-season outings while not giving up a third quarter touchdown in any of its first nine games.

Notre Dame's defense was ranked 24th in the country in pass efficiency defense and 31st in the country in scoring defense at 19.83 points per game in 1997.

While at Michigan in 1996, the Wolverines defense ranked eighth nationally in scoring defense (15.2 points per game) and Michigan was among the top teams in the (108.5 yards per game for 17th), pass efficiency defense (20th) and total defense (18th at 300.9).

In 1995, Michigan ranked 11th in total defense (286.3) and third in rushing defense (90.1).

Coaching the Texas A&M defensive line in 1991, the Aggies boasted the country's top-rated defensive unit (222.4 yards per game) as they won the Southwest Conference title and led the league in all four defensive categories. In 1990, Texas A&M stood 19th in total defense and the Aggies were 13th in 1989.

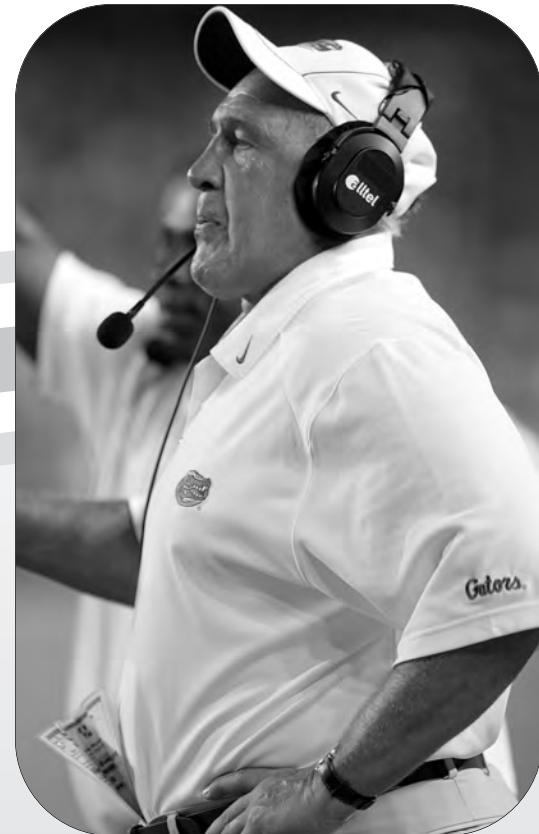

▣ Instilled an aggressive, attacking scheme at Florida that forced 31 turnovers, tops in the SEC and ninth-best nationally and recorded 33 sacks – the 25th best total nationally and best at UF since 1999. UF's 337 yards on tackles for loss in 2005 were the most in school history since records were kept in 1983.

▣ Florida's 31 turnovers resulted in 114 points or 34.3 percent of all UF's points – tops in the SEC. UF was third in the SEC in three and outs (35.3 percent of all opponent possessions).

▣ Only defensive coordinator in the nation the last 10 years to hold FSU to under 50 yards rushing in consecutive contests (34 in 2004 and 49 in 2005).

▣ Coached the SEC's leading freshmen tacklers in his first two seasons as defensive coordinator at UF (Channing Crowder in 2003 and Brandon Siler in 2004).

▣ The Florida defense improved in the following categories from 2003 to 2004: scoring defense, rushing yards per attempt, yards rushing per game, average yards per catch, average yards per completion, yards per play, yards per game and sacks per game.

▣ In his first season as the Florida defensive coordinator in 2003, the Gators ranked 22nd in the nation in pass efficiency defense and 28th in scoring defense. The 2004 team ranked 27th nationally in pass efficiency defense.

▣ In 2003, Florida improved in five different defensive categories from 2002: interceptions, pass deflections, fumble recoveries, forced fumbles and sacks.

▣ In 2003, the Gators ranked second in the SEC with 20 interceptions, which tied for the seventh-highest total in school history.

▣ UF's 30 takeaways in 2003 led the SEC.

▣ In 2002, as South Carolina's Defensive Coordinator, ranked 28th in the nation in passing defense giving up 186.92 yards per game in the air.

▣ Ranked 27th in 2001 in total defense allowing an average of 326.55 yard per game. Only 182.36 yards (16th) were given up on passing defense. Ranked 12th in the nation in scoring defense, giving way to only 18.4 points a game.

▣ In 2000, his defensive unit was ranked 16th in total defense after giving up an average of 308.09 yards per game. The corps ranked 6th nationally and first in the SEC in scoring defense, averaging 15.8 points a game, and ranked 24th in passing defense and 28th in rushing defense by allowing 193 and 115.1 yards per game, respectively.

▣ In 1999, the Gamecocks ranked 20th in total defense giving way to an average of only 307.7 yards per game.

▣ In 2001, coached a Gamecocks defense that helped the USC football team finish the year ranked in the national poll for the entire season. Also contributed to the 2001 Gamecocks finishing 13th in the final AP poll, giving USC its first nationally ranked back-to-back seasons in the program's history. The 2001 team also was the first in school history to win nine games in a season.

▣ In 2000 was a finalist for the Broyles Award, which recognizes college football's top assistant.

▣ During his stay with UF from 1991-94, Florida ranked fifth nationally in rushing defense in 1991 and 1994, and ninth in 1993. The Gators also led the SEC in rushing defense in both 1991 and 1994.

▣ In 1996 helped a Notre Dame defense that ranked 11th in total defense at 270.0 yards per game.

▣ Notre Dame set a school record for sacks with 41.5 in 1997.

Peter A. Indelicato, M.D.

Head Team Physician



Dr. Peter A. Indelicato, UF's head team physician since 1977, is one of the nation's leading orthopedic surgeons in the field of Sports Medicine. He was recently honored by his peers as the first-ever recipient of the National College Team Physician of the Year Award in 2003.

A native of New York, Dr. Indelicato attended New York Medical College and received his medical degree in 1969. He successfully completed his orthopedic residency training at NYU and spent two years in the U.S. Navy serving as a staff orthopedic surgeon at NAS Corpus Christi, Texas. Following this, he served as a sports medicine fellow at the well-known Kerlan-Jobe Orthopedic Clinic participating in the care of the Los Angeles Rams, Lakers, Dodgers, and Kings. In 1977, he was appointed as assistant professor in Orthopedics Surgery and Director of Sports Medicine at UF.

His name has been published in "The Best Doctors in America" in nine different years, most recently in 2005. He has been an honorary member of the National Athletics Trainer Association since 1984 and received its "Outstanding Services" Recognition Award in 1991. Indelicato also has also been elected a member-at-large to the American Orthopedic Society for Sports Medicine's Board of Directors and also serves as chairman for the Council of Delegates. He currently is a member of the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons, the American Orthopedics Society of Sports Medicine, the Florida Orthopedic Society, the American College of Surgeons, the Florida Medical Association, and is a founding member of the Southeastern Conference Sports Medicine Committee.

He has lectured extensively around the country on the recognition and management of athletic knee and shoulder injuries. Over the past 19 years, he has been invited to speak in 19 countries outside the United States regarding similar topics. He has made a total of 70 lectures internationally. Currently he is chairing a multi-center study looking at ligament injuries in the knee.

In 1989, he was appointed as Associate Team Physician for the Miami Dolphins and served in that capacity until 1996, when he became an orthopedic consultant for the Dolphins. Since 1999, he has been chosen as

the NFL neutral team physician. He was named the official orthopedic consultant in 2004.

Dr. Indelicato also serves as the medical director of the clinical research of Gainesville's newly built state-of-the-art Orthopedic and Sports Medicine Institute.

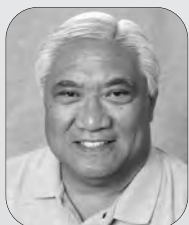
