



2011 Florida Lacrosse COMMUNICATIONS

LAST TIME OUT:

• Florida fell in the NCAA Quarterfinals to No. 5 seed Duke, 9-13, ending its stellar sophomore season. The Gators were led by the sophomore attacking tandem of Ashley Bruns (1 G, 3 A) and Kitty Cullen (2 G, 1 A) with seven points combined. Sophomore attacker Caroline Chesterman and sophomore midfielder Janine Hillier each scored two goals while sophomore midfielders Brittany Dashiell and Colby Rhea each added one.

THERE'S NO PLACE LIKE HOME:

• The Gators were undefeated at home in the regular season (11-0) and outscored opponents, 152-90, at Disney Stadium in those 11 contests. Florida scored in double digits in every one of their regular season home competitions this Spring.

MAKING HISTORY IN THE SUNSHINE STATE:

• The Orange and Blue went 1-1 in their first time hosting the NCAA Championship First Round and Quarterfinals. The Gators' NCAA First Round matchup against Stanford marked the first time any round of the NCAA Championship had been held in the state of Florida.

GATORS, ALC MAKE IWLCA HISTORY:

• Florida entered the top-10 in the IWLCA poll at No. 10 for the first time in history on Monday, March 14th. UF is the fastest-rising program (1 year, 1 month- 17 polls) to reach the top-10 since the poll's inception in 1988. The Gators also own the highest rank for a second-year program in poll history. Florida's ascension to the No. 2 spot is one better than the No. 3 rank achieved by the North Carolina Tar Heels on April 7, 1997. UF held the No. 2 spot for one week.

• The ALC was the first conference in IWLCA history to have all member schools ranked in the top 20. Florida (No. 2), Northwestern (No. 5), Penn State (No. 13), Vanderbilt (No. 17), Ohio State (No. 19) and Johns Hopkins (No. 20) were all recognized by the IWLCA for two-consecutive weeks.

BY THE NUMBERS:

• **TEAM:** Florida finished the season ranked seventh in the nation in win percentage (.800), tenth in scoring margin (4.5), 12th in scoring defense (8.95) and points (349) and 13th in scoring offense (13.45).

• **INDIVIDUAL:** IWLCA First Team All-American attacker Kitty Cullen finished the season second in the nation in goals scored (77) and goals per game (3.85), while ranking fifth in points scored (86) and 13th in points per game (4.3). IWLCA Second Team All-South Region goalkeeper Mikey Meagher is 10th in the nation in goals-against average (8.67) while IWLCA Third Team All-American attacker Ashley Bruns ranks in the top-50 in nearly every statistical category: 16th in points overall (74), 18th in assists overall (28), 33rd in points per game (3.7), 35th in goals scored overall (46) and 36th in assists per game (1.4).

Amanda O'Leary 2nd Season



Amanda O'Leary, an experienced coach who played the sport at its highest level, was hired to lead Florida's inaugural lacrosse team on June 22, 2007, giving her the opportunity to recruit and organize the program before the Gators began competition in the 2010 season.

Her career record of 188-77 (.709) ranks her No. 8 among active Division I coaches for career winning percentage. She is also No. 13 among the active Division I coaches with her 186 wins.

In just its second year of competition, the Florida lacrosse team had achieved a national ranking as high as No. 2, had 14 consecutive wins, an undefeated 11-0 home season, an ALC regular season championship, six All-Conference honors, eight ALC weekly honors, six National Player of the Week recognitions and, under O'Leary's watchful eye, seen Kitty Cullen named the ALC Player of the Year and nominated for the Tewaaron Award as only a sophomore. The Gators have defeated seven ranked opponents in 2011, including 2010 national semifinalist, Syracuse. Florida defeated then-No. 2 Northwestern, the 2010 national championship runner-up and five-time National Champions, handing them their first ALC regular season loss in seven years.

After O'Leary reeled in the nation's No. 1 Recruiting Class, many people around the nation were anxious to see how the Gators would stack up in their first season of Division I action. Facing a schedule ranked the 21st-toughest in the nation, Florida posted a 10-8 record, becoming just the sixth school in Division I women's lacrosse history to earn at least 10 wins in their first season.

The Gators won three games against top-20 opponents in 2010, highlighted by their first American Lacrosse Conference victory over No. 14 Penn State and a 14-3 win over No. 20 Johns Hopkins in the ALC Tournament quarterfinals. Freshmen Ashley Bruns, Brittany Dashiell and Jamie Reeg were named to the ALC Second Team under O'Leary's tutelage in 2010.

O'Leary came to UF from Yale, where she led the Bulldogs for 14 seasons. Yale set the school record for season wins with 14 in O'Leary's second year (1995) and twice equaled that mark (1999 and 2003). She took Yale to two of its three NCAA Championship appearances, as the Bulldogs reached the 2003 quarterfinal round and the 2007 opening round.

Yale finished among the Ivy League's top three in 11 of her 14 years, which includes a share of the 2003 Ivy League title with Princeton and Dartmouth, as each posted identical 6-1 records in conference play. After leading Yale to a share of the Ivy League title and advancing to NCAA Championship play, O'Leary was named the 2003 Northeast Regional Coach of the Year. She also was recognized as the USWLA Regional Coach of the Year in 1996. Bulldog players have earned a total of 19 All-America honors under O'Leary.

During her playing career, O'Leary was a four-year starter for Temple's lacrosse and field hockey teams. A two-time All-American in both sports, O'Leary led the Owls' lacrosse team to a 19-0 record and the national championship in 1988. O'Leary was the Midfielder of the Year selection for the NCAA All-Tournament teams in 1987 and 1988 as well as the NCAA Most Valuable Player in 1988. Lacrosse Magazine also selected her as its 1988 Player of the Year.

While suiting up with Temple's field hockey team, O'Leary garnered 1986 and 1987 All-America honors and helped the Owls reach the NCAA semifinals in 1984.

In 2005, O'Leary was inducted into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame. She also became a member of the Temple Owls' Hall of Fame in the fall of 2004. O'Leary was named to the NCAA Women's Lacrosse

25th Anniversary Team in the fall of 2006.

She was the youngest player and starter on the 1989 U.S. World Cup team that claimed the International Federation of Women's Lacrosse Association (IFWLA) gold medal in Perth, Australia. O'Leary was the second-leading scorer on the 1993 U.S. World Cup team which repeated as the IFWLA World Cup champions in Edinburgh, Scotland. In the 1993 World Cup, O'Leary scored 17 points, including the game-winner versus Australia in the semifinal game.

Prior to taking the Yale head coaching position, O'Leary was an assistant at Maryland for the 1992 and 1993 seasons. The Terrapins claimed the 1992 NCAA title and reached the semifinals in 1993. It was her second stint with the Terrapins, as she started her coaching career with Maryland as a graduate assistant coach in 1989 before serving as an assistant at Delaware for the 1990 campaign.

O'Leary has also served as the chair of the U.S. Team selection and on the former U.S. Women's Lacrosse Association (USWLA) Board of Directors. She was an assistant coach with the U.S. Women's Developmental Team from 2002-05 and has been a member of the Connecticut Lacrosse Foundation Executive Committee since 1993.

She and her husband, Kevin O'Leary, have a daughter, Madison, and a son, Ryan. She graduated cum laude from Temple in 1988 with a bachelor's degree in exercise physiology and kinesiology.

Erica LaGrow

2nd Season



Erica LaGrow, a decorated player from the University of North Carolina, was named an assistant coach for the University of Florida lacrosse program in August of 2008.

In 2010, LaGrow was very influential in leading a Gator offense that averaged 12.39 goals per game, ranking fourth in the American Lacrosse Conference and 25th in the nation. She was an important part of the development of national Rookie of the Year Ashley Bruns, who ranked third in the conference and 12th in the nation in total points (79).

Florida scored at least 10 goals in 12 of its 18 games and beat two top-20 opponents by more than 10 goals. Five different players scored over 20 goals, led by Bruns' 48 as a true freshman. In the ALC Quarterfinals, the Gators upset No. 20 Johns Hopkins after jumping out to a 9-0 lead in the first half on their way to a 14-3 victory. Florida became just the sixth school in Division I women's lacrosse history to earn 10 or more wins in their inaugural season after posting a 10-8 record.

As a Tar Heel, LaGrow racked up 24 goals during her senior season in 2008 and was named second-team All-South Regional for the second time in her career. The four-year starter was named to the first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference team as a senior and the conference honor roll every year. The midfielder also earned All-ACC Academic honors twice. She ended her collegiate career with 80 goals and 15 assists for 95 points. She also picked up 90 ground balls and controlled 84 draws. LaGrow helped the Tar Heels to the NCAA Championship Quarterfinals four consecutive years.

LaGrow gained international playing experience with the U.S. Women's Elite team in 2007 and 2008, and was a member of the touring team, which captured the 2008 Prague Cup in June.

During the summer of 2009, LaGrow joined the U.S. Women's Elite team at the Federation of International Lacrosse Women's World Cup in Prague. She scored four goals in four games during the group stage and helped the team to a perfect 4-0 record heading into the elimination rounds. The U.S. would go on to win the gold medal with an 8-7 victory over Australia. With the victory, LaGrow joined head coach Amanda O'Leary and assistant coach Caitlyn McFadden as World Cup gold-medal winners.

Since 2004, LaGrow has been compiling coaching experience to go along with her outstanding playing abilities. She spent four summers as a volunteer coach at the Star-Riders Lacrosse Club in Central New York, coaching and mentoring high school players. She also prepared and implemented their practice plans. She served as camp director at Treasure Valley Lacrosse Girls' Camp in Eagle, Idaho, and Ultimate Goal Lacrosse Camp in Marcellus, N.Y.

1st Season



Caitlyn McFadden, the 2009 and 2010 ACC Player of the Year and the 2010 NCAA Championship Most Outstanding Player, was named assistant lacrosse coach at the University of Florida in July of 2010.

McFadden is involved in all aspects of the Gator lacrosse program.

McFadden is coming off a highly decorated career with the 2010 National Champion Maryland Terrapins. In her senior season, she was named the Tewaaraton Award Winner and Honda Sports Award Winner (and was a finalist for both awards in 2009), the ACC Player of the Year and Tournament MVP (also won both conference awards in 2009), IWLCA National Midfielder of the Year, and the Suzanne Tyler Award winner, which is awarded to the University of Maryland Female Athlete of the Year. She was also a two-time IWLCA First-Team All-American in her final two years as a Terp and IWLCA Second-Team All-American in her sophomore year.

McFadden served as the captain for the Terrapins in her junior and senior seasons. She is also a member of the United States Women's Lacrosse National Team, having won a gold medal at the 2009 FIL World Cup in Prague, Czech Republic with current Gators assistant coach, Erica LaGrow. She recorded four assists en route to a perfect 4-0 record heading into the elimination rounds. The U.S. would go on to win the gold medal with an 8-7 victory over Australia.

McFadden found the perfect balance of that success in her time at Maryland, being named the ACC Women's Lacrosse Scholar Athlete of the Year in her junior and senior seasons, and the University of Maryland Female Scholar Athlete of the Year in her senior season. She was also named to the All-ACC Academic Team, ACC Honor Roll, and the University of Maryland Dean's List each of her years at Maryland.

McFadden has been honing her coaching abilities every summer since 2007, working as an instructor for Elevate Lacrosse Camps and Maximum Exposure Lacrosse Camps. She also conducts camps along with her National Team cohorts across the country, teaching youth about lacrosse and the National Team.

The Phoenix, Md. native finished her career with 149 goals and 110 assists for 259 total points. McFadden left the Terrapins as the sixth-leading scorer in program history, having started every game of her collegiate career.

- Sophomore attacker Kitty Cullen has been nearly unstoppable so far this season, having scored 75 goals on 148 shots (.507) in 19 games, including owning a .757 shot on goal percentage. The ALC Player of the Year has scored over double the goals she scored in 2010 (31 G). She has 83 points on the year thus far.
- Ashley Bruns has certainly had a target on her back as the reigning National Rookie of the Year, but she's used it to her advantage, finding her teammates open when she's been double-teamed. Bruns now leads the team in assists (25) through 19 games, while also scoring 45 goals (70 points) en route to being named First Team All-ALC. Bruns' 18-game scoring streak ended in the NCAA Tournament against Stanford. She had a 15-game scoring streak in 2010.
- Sophomore midfielder Brittany Dashiell has been tenacious defensively and on the draw, grabbing 30 ground balls and 44 draw controls. Her 12-game streak of earning a draw control ended against No. 16 Penn State. She had a 15-game streak last season.
- Sophomore midfielder Janine Hillier has had a hot streak as of late. In the past three games, she has scored 12 goals on 19 shots (.632) and was named Second Team All-ALC and ALC All-Tournament Team.
- Sophomores Jamie Reeg and Sam Farrell have been stalwarts on defense, leading the Gator defense with 30 and 27 ground balls, respectively.
- The Gators have been impenetrable in the midfield and on defense, grabbing 267 ground balls and 248 draw controls. Florida is adept at reading defenses as well, as the Gators have been able to find the open attacker, notching 76 assists to opponents' 40.

Despite pushing the game into overtime, the Gators' upset bid fell short as the No. 3 North Carolina Tar Heels defeated No. 17 Florida in overtime, 10-9.

The No. 17 Florida lacrosse team, led by the school-record tying six goals by sophomore Kitty Cullen, defeated the No. 20 Denver Pioneers, 15-7, on Sunday afternoon in front of a crowd of 687 at Donald R. Disney Stadium.

Cullen notched eight points overall on Sunday, good for third in program history, while recording a .600 shooting percentage. National Rookie of the Year Ashley Bruns had seven points on the afternoon, scoring a hat trick while also notching a career-high tying four assists. Florida allowed another Denver goal before Cullen got her final score of the afternoon, a driving shot as Cullen cut through the Pioneers' defense.

Denver rattled off four straight goals in the final five minutes of the contest but it wasn't enough as the Gators came away with the victory and improved to 2-1 on the season.

The No. 14 Florida lacrosse team upset No. 9 Georgetown, 17-10, on a rainy Wednesday evening at Donald R. Dizney Stadium. The victory over the Hoyas marks the first-ever defeat of a top-10 ranked opponent in program history. The Gators are now riding a five-game winning streak, the longest in program history.

Florida was led by sophomore midfielders Kitty Cullen and Brittany Dashiell with four goals apiece. Sophomore attacker Ashley Bruns contributed four points, as she found the back of the net three times and assisted on a Dashiell score in the second half.

The Gators had a total team effort as Florida saw seven players score for the third-straight game. Janine Hillier and Caroline Cochran each netted two for the Gators while Caroline Chesterman notched a goal for Florida. Freshman Krista Grabher scored her first-ever goal in the Orange and Blue, sparking a three-goal run for the Gators late in the second half after play had resumed.

Out of the delay, Georgetown once again found the back of the net twice, but Grabher stepped up in Cullen's absence, cutting through the defense and finding the back of the net with just 7:39 remaining in the contest. No. 14 Florida, fresh off a 17-10 upset of No. 9 Georgetown on Wednesday night, downed Temple University, 19-4, on Saturday afternoon at Donald R. Dizney Stadium.

Eight different Gators scored against the Owls, led by sophomore midfielder Kitty Cullen's six points, including five goals on the afternoon. Cullen now has 32 goals on the season thus far, eclipsing her 31 goals total in her freshman campaign.

Caroline Chesterman tied her career-high with four goals on the afternoon while Ashley Bruns had five points against the Owls (2 G, 3 A). Florida also saw multi-goal performances by sophomore attacker/midfielder Colby Rhea, redshirt freshman Hayley Katzenberger, who scored her first goals as a Gator, and freshman midfielder Krista Grabher, who had two goals against the Owls.

Florida also received valuable points from redshirt freshman Erin Graziano, who scored her first-career goal, sophomore midfielder Brittany Dashiell, whose goal sparked a nine-goal run in the middle of the contest, and a great assist by sophomore midfielder/defender Kayla Stolins, who assisted on a Chesterman goal after Stolins caused a turnover and sprinted past five defenders to find Chesterman open in front of the net.

The 19 goals by the Gators are the highest output by the Orange and Blue all season. The Gators haven't scored that many goals since March 17, 2010, when Florida defeated Marist, 22-3.

Florida came right out of the gate with Rhea scoring back-to-back goals in the first three minutes of the contest. Cullen found the back of the net two minutes later to put the Gators ahead, 3-0. Temple's Stephany Parcell scored for Temple before Florida went on a four-goal run, sparked by Chesterman's first goal of the afternoon. The Gators kept the momentum for much of the half, only allowing two Owls scores in the first half.

Florida used tough defense to halt the Owls time and again, as they were only able to get off 14 shots through the entire contest, scoring just four times (26). The Gator defense had six caused turnovers on the afternoon and Temple had 13 turnovers in the second half while only shooting the ball four times. The Gators on the other hand, came out firing in the second half, scoring 10 goals on 12 shots (.833), including nine-straight from 1:16 remaining in the first half to 14:20 remaining in the second half.

The Gators held the Owls scoreless until well into the second half, continuing the momentum, highlighted by back-to-back scores by Chesterman and Cullen. Katzenberger scored the first goal of her career in the 46th minute of the contest, as she cut through the Temple defense and found the back of the net. Katzenberger scored again less than four minutes later, as Cullen unselfishly found an open Katzenberger while Cullen was prepared for a free position shot.

Grabher notched her second goal of the afternoon with 8:17 remaining on the clock to give the Gators an 18-3 lead. Temple scored on a free position shot two minutes later but the Gators had one more answer for the Owls, as Graziano sped up the field and scored her first collegiate goal with 36 seconds remaining in the contest.

Sophomore goalkeeper Mikey Meagher played an unbelievable game, coming up with saves when Temple was able to penetrate the Gator defense, and forcing the Owls to go 0-for-4 on free position shots.

Florida has now won six games straight, including five at home. The Gators are undefeated when scoring in double digits and held its fourth opponent to single digit scoring this season. The four goals for Temple were the lowest allowed by the Gators since Florida's upset of Johns Hopkins in the ALC Tournament last year (May 6, 2010).

The Gators were led by sophomore attacker Ashley Bruns, who tied her career-high and her own school record with six goals while adding an assist for a season-high seven points. Florida also saw hat tricks from sophomore midfielders Kitty Cullen and Brittany Dashiell.

Sophomore attacker Janine Hillier tied her career high in points with four (2 goals, 2 assists), adding two draw controls. Sophomore attacker Caroline Chesterman scored and added an assist while sophomore midfielder Jamie Reeg scored her first goal of the season.

The Gators were a perfect 4-for-4 from free position and outshot the Orange, 27-20. Florida won the battle on the draw, 18-10, continuing the Gators' streak of winning the game when out-drawing their opponent. The game was physical from start to finish and was certainly a game of runs. Florida opened the afternoon on a 7-0 run before Ohio State went on a 5-0 run that lasted into the second half. The Gators once again won the battle of the draw, notching 13 draw controls to the Buckeyes' seven. Florida continues to outshoot its opponents, as the Gators held a 27-20 shooting advantage.

The second half was much tighter than the first but Florida held on for the victory, matching the Gators' wins (10) from last season and ALC victories (one) from Florida's inaugural season.

Tevaaron watch list honoree Kitty Cullen led the Gators with a career-high tying six goals on the afternoon, also tying her own program record which she shares with Ashley Bruns. Sophomore midfielder Brittany Dashiell and freshman midfielder Krista Grabher each assisted on goals.

Prior to this evening's contest, Northwestern hadn't lost a regular-season ALC contest since May 6, 2004, a 10-9 overtime loss to Vanderbilt.

Florida was led by Tewaaratron watch list honoree Kitty Cullen with six goals on the evening, including three of the Gators' four second half goals. Caroline Chesterman had a hat trick against the Wildcats while Ashley Bruns and Janine Hillier each contributed two goals. Brittany Dashiell had all of the Gators' assists against Northwestern, registering three points.

ALC Defensive Player of the Week Mikey Meagher showed why she was given that honor with 10 saves on the evening, including two clutch saves in the closing minutes when Florida was playing down two players due to yellow cards. Meagher also had two ground balls and a caused turnover. The Gators were a perfect 22-for-22 on clears and Meagher never allowed a goal off a Florida turnover.

Florida's defense played another incredible game, led by Emily Dohony's five ground balls.

The Gators only trailed once the entire game, as Northwestern's Erin Fitzgerald scored her in the first 22 seconds, her first of four goals on the evening.

Brun's sparked a 5-0 Gator run as she was able to find the top corner of the net for her first score of the evening. Cullen wasn't too far behind, scoring from Dashiell to give the Gators the lead for good. Cullen scored again less than two minutes later from free position and continued the Florida momentum.

Chesterman then scored her first goal of the evening off a rebounded shot from the post. Bruns first had the shot on goal and it bounced off the post, allowing Chesterman to scoop the ball into the back of the net.

Cullen continued the Gator rhythm, notching a hat trick less than 15 minutes into the game for the sixth time this season. Cullen has never scored less than three goals in every game this season and tonight was no different.

Fitzgerald cut the Gator momentum, as she scored unassisted with 11:52 remaining in the half. The nation's leading point scorer, Shannon Smith, then found the back of the net thanks to Alex Frank to inch closer to the Florida lead, 5-3.

Chesterman scored from Dashiell to widen the gap back to three goals before Hillier scored unassisted after shaking off three Northwestern defenders. Frank scored again for the Wildcats before the Gators closed the half with another Hillier goal and a Chesterman score from Dashiell with only 26 seconds remaining in the half. The Gators took a 9-4 lead into intermission.

The Wildcats staged a furious second-half rally, storming back from a five-goal halftime deficit to cut the lead to one goal twice. Fitzgerald opened the Wildcat scoring again, just 1:13 into the second stanza. Smith then found the back of the net less than a minute later before Frank scored from free position to put three total goals on the board just over three minutes into the second half.

Brun's was able to score unassisted to halt the Wildcat momentum, keeping the Gators' lead to three at 10-7 with 23:31 to go in the game. Northwestern's Ali Cassera scored from free position to inch back within two before Cullen scored two free position goals within nearly two minutes of each other to push the Florida lead back to four at 12-8 with 14:44 remaining.

Northwestern answered with a flurry of goals, scoring three in six minutes to cut the lead to just one with 6:37 remaining in the game. Florida needed to win a draw control in order to get its momentum back, and it came in the form of freshman midfielder Kelsey Dlugos. Dlugos' 5-10 build was enough to pressure the Wildcats' Alyssa Leonard, who helps the Wildcats lead the nation in draw controls. Dlugos won the draw and Cullen was able to score unassisted to seal the win for the Gators, 13-11.

Florida barely outshot Northwestern, 31-30, and won the battle on the ground, 16-10. Northwestern continued their dominance on the draw, as they have all season, winning 17 draw controls to Florida's nine. Turnovers hurt Northwestern, as the Wildcats had 13 on the evening and the Gators only had eight.

Sophomore midfielder Brittany Dashiell scored the game-winning goal from free position with 30 seconds remaining in the second half to give the No. 6 Gators their first American Lacrosse Conference regular season championship outright, defeating the No. 17 Vanderbilt Commodores, 8-7. Dashiell's goal secured Florida's first undefeated conference season and it was the first true game-winner in Florida history.

The Gators were led by sophomore attacker Ashley Bruns with five points on the afternoon, contributing a hat trick and two assists. Dashiell and sophomore midfielder Caroline Chesterman each contributed two goals while redshirt freshman midfielder Hayley Katzenberger added her fifth goal of the season. Dashiell, sophomore midfielder Kitty Cullen and sophomore attacker Janine Hillier each had an assist for the Gators. Sophomore goalkeeper Mikey Meagher had seven saves in goal for Florida.

The Gators fell behind early, courtesy of All-American Ally Carey and the Commodores' leading scorer Courtney Kirk, who teamed up for a Vanderbilt goal just 12 seconds into the contest. VU found the back of the net again on a Katherine Denkler goal less than two minutes later. Florida, who hadn't fell behind by two goals since their only loss of the season against then-No. 3 North Carolina, wasn't going to be held scoreless for long, as Bruns scored unassisted to bring the tally to 1-2 4:29 into the contest.

Denkler put Vanderbilt back on the board with the first of the Commodores' three free position goals but Bruns answered once again, scoring back-to-back goals in just 1:03. The Ellicott City, Md. Native scored her second goal of the afternoon unassisted, as she came from the right side of the goal and shook off two Vanderbilt defenders. Her third goal came from a great pass from Cullen, knotting the score at 3-3. The teams continued to trade goals, as Kendall Pittinger scored from Carey.

Katzenberger then found the back of the net from Dashiell, as she was able to weave her way through the Commodore defense and score to even the game at four goals apiece. Both teams were held scoreless for 5:30 before Chesterman scored from a behind the goal pass from Bruns to give the Gators their first lead of the afternoon, 5-4. Vanderbilt's Alex Priddy scored from free position to tie things up again at 5-5. Dashiell scored her first goal of the afternoon from Bruns with a little over two minutes remaining in the half to put Florida ahead by one, but the lead was short-lived. Carey scored from Emily Franke to put the Gators and the Commodores even at 6-6 heading into halftime.

The second half was a tale of two defenses, as the defense for both teams combined to produce 12 turnovers in the second stanza. The Commodores caused five turnovers on the afternoon while the Gators caused six. Ground balls were even for the teams, tied at 14 apiece for the contest. The Gator defense played as a unit on Saturday afternoon, holding Florida's seventh opponent this season to seven goals or less. After Franke scored from free position less than three minutes into the second half, both teams were held scoreless for 18 minutes as the defenses put on a show.

The stalemate was finally broken by Chesterman as she scored the tying goal with 9:51 remaining in the contest. She scored from the left side of the crease from Hillier to keep the teams even at 7-7. Both the Gators and the Commodores had their chances to regain the lead, but it wasn't until Dashiell got fouled in the eight-meter with 30 seconds remaining that the Gators got their final chance for the victory. As Dashiell lined up on the hash mark, the majority of the Vanderbilt defense found themselves on the opposite side, having been placed there from the spot of the foul. Dashiell scored her 28th goal of the season and sealed the victory for the Gators, 8-7.

The No. 1 seeded Florida lacrosse team reached its first ALC Tournament final after the Gators defeated fourth-seeded Ohio State, 16-13, on Friday afternoon at VU Lacrosse Complex. The Orange and Blue move to Saturday's Championship game to face No. 2 seed Northwestern, who defeated third-seeded Penn State, 14-3. The Gators and the Wildcats will relive their epic 13-11 April matchup at 1:00p.m. on Saturday afternoon. With the win, the Gators have given head coach Amanda O'Leary 15 wins in a single season, the most of her head coaching career. Florida is now 15-2 on the season while Ohio State falls to 10-7.

Florida was led by Ashley Bruns and Janine Hillier with six points apiece, both with four goals and two assists. Hillier's goal and point totals were new career bests and her two assists tied her current career high. Hillier was also three-for-three from free position. Tewaaron nominee Kitty Cullen had a hat trick for the 15th game this season, adding an assist, two draw controls, a ground ball and a caused turnover. Brittany Dashiell had two goals on the afternoon, as well as a game-high five draw controls and three ground balls. Caroline Chesterman, Caroline Cochran and Colby Rhea added a goal apiece.

The Buckeyes pulled within two, 13-11, keeping possession for over 10 minutes. Hillier was able to stop the Gators' scoring drought, scoring from free position to put Florida back on the board with less than 10 minutes to play. Markwordt scored again unassisted before Bruns scored her fourth goal of the game from Cullen to get ahead, 15-12.

Ohio State moved to change goalies in the closing minutes of the game and Cochran was able to score on an open goal as their second goalkeeper, Megan Fiorito, was charged with the goal while running from the sideline. Ohio State's starting goalkeeper, Annie Carruthers, had 10 saves on the afternoon.

The No. 4 Florida lacrosse team fell to No. 3 Northwestern in the ALC Tournament final, 10-9, on Saturday afternoon at VU Lacrosse Complex. With the win, second-seeded Northwestern continues to be the only champion in the history of the tournament. First-seeded Florida reached its first-ever ALC Tournament final in only its second year of existence.

The Gators were led by Caroline Chesterman with three goals on the afternoon. Ashley Bruns and Brittany Dashiell had two apiece, while sophomore midfielder Janine Hillier and sophomore defender Jamie Reeg each added a goal. Tewaaron nominee Kitty Cullen contributed an assist. Bruns had four ground balls and three caused turnovers. Goalkeeper Mikey Meagher had four saves and three ground balls and Kayla Stolins led the Gator defense with three ground balls and two caused turnovers.

Florida had as much as a three-goal lead at 8-5 but Northwestern came storming back, going on a 5-0 run to take a 10-8 lead with 2:22 remaining. Bruns scored after causing a turnover from Rookie of the Year Alyssa Leonard but it wasn't enough, as the Gators gave up a crucial possession with just 1:15 remaining in the game.

The Orange and Blue opened the game off a goal by Chesterman from Cullen, ending a 4-30 scoring drought by both teams. Dashiell found the back of the net a little over two minutes later, giving the Gators a 2-0 lead. Northwestern's Amanda Macaluso scored at 20:20, ending nearly 10 scoreless minutes for the Wildcats. ALC Tournament MVP Shannon Smith scored unassisted a little over a minute later to tie the game at 2 apiece.

Hillier scored a minute later to give the Gators a slight edge before the Wildcats' Jessica Russo split the Gator defense after a feed from Smith. Bruns and Dashiell scored back-to-back Gator goals to put Florida up by two at 5-3 with less than five minutes to play in the half. Northwestern's Erin Fitzgerald scored from Smith to finish the scoring for the half and send the teams into intermission at 5-4.

Smith continued her offensive tear, scoring an unassisted goal 5:20 into the second half to knot the score at 5-5. The Gators then went on a streak of their own, scoring three straight goals to take their largest lead of the game at 8-5. Reeg broke away from her defender to score her third goal of the season. Chesterman then scored back-to-back goals, both while being heavily defended within the eight-meter. The first was a spinning shot over the shoulder of her defenders. The second was deflected from a Northwestern stick and floated in past Wildcats goalkeeper Brienne LoManto.

Northwestern answered with their final scoring drive, going on a 5-0 run to put them ahead 10-8 with 2:22 remaining. Bruns was able to score on a breakaway after causing a Leonard turnover and pull within one. The teams were fighting for the final possession but as Dohony won the final draw control and Florida called a timeout, the officials found Cullen to have an illegal stick and Northwestern was given possession. Bruns caused a final turnover in the closing seconds but Northwestern's fifth tournament title bid was complete, defeated the Gators, 10-9.

Florida won the ground ball battle, 16-10, but Northwestern continued their dominance in the center, winning 13 draw controls to Florida's eight. The Gators had three free position opportunities but were never able to capitalize on any of them. The Orange and Blue outshot the Wildcats, 25-22.

Gator sophomores Emily Dohony, Sam Farrell and Hillier were named to the 2011 ALC All-Tournament Team.

Exactly a month after the Gators' history-making victory over No. 2 Northwestern at Dizney Stadium, the fourth-seeded Florida lacrosse team made history once again, as they won their first-ever NCAA Tournament game against the Stanford Cardinal, 13-11. The Gators were not only victorious in their first NCAA Tournament appearance, they won the first NCAA Tournament game to ever be played in the state of Florida. The Gators move on to host the winner of fifth-seeded Duke and Penn.

Florida was led by Brittany Dashiell who played arguably her most balanced game of the season with five points (3g, 2a) against the Cardinal, while adding three draw controls, two ground balls and a caused turnover. Kitty Cullen and Janine Hillier each had four goals for the Gators, while Caroline Chesterman and Colby Rhea added a goal apiece.

Despite hours of rain delay, the Gators came out on fire, scoring four goals in 5:34 to take a quick 4-0 lead to start the contest. Dashiell scored 24 seconds into the game before Cullen scored a hat trick in just over five minutes, giving the Gators a four-goal lead. Stanford began to find their footing, going on a 4-0 run of their own behind Carolyn Bradley, Anna Boeri, Emily Boeri and Karen Nesbitt. Florida was held scoreless for 24 minutes, but Hillier broke the stalemate, scoring from Dashiell with 13 seconds remaining in the half to give the Gators a 5-4 advantage heading into the intermission.

The Gators hadn't won a second half in their last five games but the Orange and Blue came out of the locker room with determination as Hillier picked up where she left off in the second half, scoring just 20 seconds into the second stanza. It wasn't long before Dashiell found the back of the net again just 22 seconds later to put the Gators ahead, 7-4. Stanford staged a comeback of their own, rattling off four straight, including three consecutive goals off the stick of Lauren Schmidt to take their first lead of the game at 8-7.

Dashiell scored off free position to knot the game at 8-8 before the Cardinal's Anna Kim found the back of the cage from Nesbitt to take their final lead of the contest before Florida gained the momentum back. Rhea scored off a perfect feed from Dashiell to tie the game at 10 apiece before Chesterman scored her first free position goal of the season to take the lead at 10-9. Stanford's Sarah Flynn tied the game for the final time with her unassisted goal before Hillier went on a tear, scoring back-to-back goals in less than two minutes to put Florida ahead, 12-10.

Hillier has been on a hot streak as of late, scoring 12 goals on her last 19 shots for a .632 shooting average and a .789 shot on goal percentage. Foard scored from free position to put the Cardinal within one, 12-11. Cullen ripped the final goal of the evening, a sidarm shot from nearly 12 meters away, to give Florida a 13-11 advantage with 10:15 remaining in the contest.

The Gators then went on the defensive, led by goalkeeper Mikey Meagher's eight second-half saves, as Florida was able to hold off a Stanford offense that is ranked No. 2 in the country. The Gators stalled for the final 4:43, executing a flawless stall which forced five Stanford fouls and a yellow card, Florida never lost possession and kept the ball moving around the field in the closing minutes, leading to a standing ovation from the Gator crowd.

Florida outshot Stanford, 27-26, and won the game on the ground, 15-14. The Gators had 13 turnovers to the Cardinal's 15 and Meagher's 11 saves marked her fourth game of the season with double-digit saves.

The Gators were led by the sophomore attacking tandem of Ashley Bruns (1 G, 3 A) and Kitty Cullen (2 G, 1 A) with seven points combined. Sophomore attacker Caroline Chesterman and sophomore midfielder Janine Hillier each scored two goals while sophomore midfielders Brittany Dashiell and Colby Rhea each added one.

Florida struck first with a Bruns-assisted goal by Cullen just 2:07 into the afternoon. Duke answered a little over a minute later with a goal by Christie Kaestner to even the score at 1-1. The Blue Devils' Sarah Bullard, a U.S. national team member, scored unassisted to give Duke its first lead of the game at 2-1 with 23:30 to play in the first half. Rhea scored off another Bruns assist to tie it back at 2-2 but Duke would go on a 2-0 run sparked by Tewaaron finalist Emma Hamm and All-ACC honoree Kaestner and Kat Thomas to go ahead, 2-4.

Chesterman scored unassisted to put the Gators back in the game with 16:54 remaining before the Blue Devils went on another 2-0 run thanks to free-position goals from Hamm and Makenzie Hommel, closing out the scoring for the first half. The Blue Devils held the advantage heading in the locker room, 3-6. The three-goal deficit was the second-largest the Gators have ever faced. Florida faced a four-goal halftime deficit in their 6-9 loss to Cornell.

Out of the locker room, the Gators went on a 4-1 run to knot the score at 7-7 with 24:29 remaining. Bruns opened the scoring for the Gators with a goal assisted by Cullen just 42 seconds into the second stanza. Thomas scored unassisted again before Florida had three unanswered goals by Chesterman, Cullen and Dashiell to even the score.

Thomas scored again to give Duke the lead before Hillier scored back-to-back unassisted goals with 17:26 remaining in the game to give Florida its first lead since the 2:07 mark of the first half (1-0). The momentum shifted back Duke's direction after costly turnovers by Florida gave the Blue Devils possession, despite Florida's nine second-half draw controls. Duke went on a 5-0 tear to end the game and punch its ticket to Stony Brook.

The teams were practically even in every statistical category, with Florida outshooting Duke, 23-21. The Gators continued to win the game on the ground, scooping 10 ground balls to the Blue Devils' nine. Duke continued its dominance on the draw, winning 13 draw controls to Florida's 11. Both teams' goalkeepers were held to five saves or less, as Duke's Mollie Mackler had five saves and three ground balls and Florida's Mikey Meagher had four saves and one ground ball.
